

California lawmakers eye back-up power for cellphone towers

That included more than half of the cell towers in Marin County alone... Democratic lawmakers revealed legislation to force telecommunication companies to have at least 72 hours of back-up power for all cellphone towers in high-risk fire areas."

Communication Tips for Cell/Smartphones

- > Send text messages if voice network unavailable
- Drive to an alternate location to improve reception
- Use Smartphone's GPS to locate family and friends
 - Requires advance set up
 - iPhone: Find My Phone app / Family Sharing
 - Android: Family Link app

Power Up: Staying Connected

The Basics

- Lower screen brightness
- Change Power settings:
 - iPhone: Activate Low Power Mode
 - Android: Activate Battery Saver
- > Turn off non-essential notifications from apps
- Don't expose device to heat / prolonged, direct sunlight
- Turn off Bluetooth
- Turn off automatic app updates
- > Re-charge device at public "charging stations," coffee shops, etc.



POWER BANKS

Charge the Power Bank, then use the Bank to charge your device.





Wall plug purchased separately. May be able to use the wall plug that came with your phone or tablet, if the wall plug is compatible with the amps required by the Power Bank.

POWER BANKS - Options

- > Price \$20 \$75
- Charging plug usually purchased separately
 - May be able to use your phone's charging plug
- Physical form factor: ranges from pocket sized to table top
- Charging Speed amount of time to charge the power bank
- Single vs multiple device connection
- > Type of connection port (USB, USB-type C): pertains to the type

of connector on the cable used by your device.

POWER BANKS - Charging Capacity

- Larger form-factor generally indicates higher capacity
- Capacity stated in Milliamp Hours (ex: 10000 mAh)
 - Higher number = more charging capacity
 - # Charges realized is dependent on phone's or tablet's battery size
- Online listings often mention specific phone models and how many times you can fully charge those devices when the Power Bank is, itself, fully charged.

POWER BANKS - SAFETY

- Purchase reputable brands:
 - Some examples: Anker, Belkin, Mophie
 - If from Amazon, make sure Amazon is the "Seller"



- > Do not charge your device on soft surfaces, such as a couch or bed.
- > Use the charger in a place you can keep an eye on it in case it overheats.
- > Use the wall plug that came with your device. If you need a new plug:
 - Purchase a reputable brand
 - Make sure the voltage and current are compatible with the battery
- Don't use batteries that are swollen or dented







Information — Planning

- > Set up personal medical information and Emergency Contacts
 - First responders are trained to look for this information!
- ➢ iPhone −
 - Use Heath App (included with phone)
 - Set "Show when locked" to enable viewing when phone is locked




- Android
 - Instructions vary by phone manufacturer (Samsung, LG, etc.)




Miscellaneous Tips

Miscellaneous Tips

- Use phone's flashlight (preferably not for long periods!)
- Store important documents in the cloud
- Download movies from Amazon, Netflix, Comcast, etc.
 - Download in advance of expected power outage
 - Ensure you have adequate back up power... you might need your device to be powered up for more important purposes than watching a movie!
